Parents / Caregivers / Guardians Opinion Survey

School Wide Positive Behaviour







Year 1/2 Classes - Time






Year 3/4 Classes – Literature Circles

This week the students in Grade 3/4 started our Literature Circle lessons! Over the last few weeks of Term 3, and into Term 4, students will have the opportunity to work in collaborative Literature Circle groups with students from other 3/4 classes. Literature Circles build students' comprehension and discussion skills, by giving them the chance to read a book with and alongside peers, develop an in-depth understanding of the text, and support each other's understanding with an engaging discussion. We have now had two lessons and are off to a great start!







Year 5/6 Classes - Mathematics

This week, our Grade 5-6s have been exploring coordinate systems as part of their Location and Transformation Mathematics unit. Our focus in the latter part of the unit has been the practical application of coordinate systems, with a particular focus on maps. For this activity, students drew their own maps and set a series of challenges for a partner to solve.


Specialist - Auslan LOTE

In Auslan students from P-6 have been learning about where their signing space is located and why it plays an important part in giving signs meaning. Students have also been learning the Southern Dialect signs for colours. They have been using these new signs to describe animals and play simple Auslan games. Students have enjoyed working together to sort colour signs by Auslan handshapes. Auslan uses a combination of hand shapes, movements and facial expressions to deliver messages.









Students have also been translating a simple repetitive English text about colours and animals into Auslan. They were so excited to have the opportunity to sign a whole text.


More than 300 athletes from over 30 countries competed in the 6th *Deaf World Swimming Championships* earlier this month at the Olympic Swimming Complex – Parque Roca, Buenos Aires. 7 swimmers from across Australia (4 from Victoria) were selected to compete for Deaf Swimming Australia at these Championships.



15 year old, Imogen Nolan from VIC was the youngest competitor on the team. She took home Silver in the Women's 200m Breaststroke with her Australian Record time of 2:50.22. She just missed out on medals in the 50m Breaststroke, 100m Breaststroke, finishing in 4th place for those events. Her swimming journey started when she commenced a learn to swim program where her swim teacher was a CODA (Child of Deaf Adults). Her teacher used Auslan (Australian Sign Language) when communicating with Imogen, and this was the start of her passion for swimming.


