Year 5/6 Interschool Sport



What's Happening In Our Classrooms

Prep - Smart Spelling

Last week in our revision week for Smart Spelling, the preps participated in phonics rotations each morning, with each day being a different focus. On Tuesday we practised the word 'cat' and the common words 'on and 'the', on Wednesday we practised the word 'ant' and the common words 'that' and 'had', on Thursday we practised the word 'tin' and the common words 'it', 'is' and 'big', and lastly on Friday we practised the word 'tap' and the common words 'on', 'and' & 'off'. Throughout the week, the Preps had fun learning and practising their words through hands-on activities that also helped develop fine motor skills. Some groups used play dough to form words, others traced them in salt, some rolled dice and wrote words in rainbow colours, and one group worked with the teacher on the floor, writing down common words. Each rotation was 5 minutes long, and the children thoroughly enjoyed showing their learning in creative ways. What a fun and productive week it was for our Preps!







Year 1/2 – Inquiry Unit - 'Playing It Safe'

In our inquiry unit we have been exploring ways we can deal with conflict, such as a disagreement with a friend. We watched a story called 'A Line in the Sand' which showed a disagreement between friends through pictures. Together we discussed what we could see happening to the characters and how we could tell how they were feeling. We also looked at the way the characters reacted to those feelings and the behaviours this led to. Our students made some really insightful and considered responses to this prompt. As a class we then worked through some problem solving steps that we can use if we are having a disagreement and some ways we can come to a resolution when we are having a disagreement.



Year 3/4 – Inquiry Unit

As part of their Inquiry unit Year 3/4s have been perfecting their research skills to expand their knowledge of Communities, Celebrations and Commemorations around the world. Students enjoyed using a variety of sources such as Epic Readers, fact files and informative texts to develop their knowledge of celebrations and commemorations such as ANZAC day and St Patrick's Day. Last week students displayed brilliant teamwork to work together to research the celebrations of Ramadan, Day of the Dead, Diwali, and Passover. They collaborated in teams to create bright, colourful and informative posters that included key information such as when the celebrations occur, how people celebrate and why the celebration takes place. The students then shared their wonderful posters in a presentation to the rest of the class.

Year 5/6 – Inquiry Websites

This week, as part of the Year 5/6 Unit of Inquiry: Bright Sparks, students began working on a project that will form a substantial part of their end of term Inquiry assessment. For this project, each 5/6 class is developing their own website, focusing on the many different types of energy sources that can be harnessed to create electricity. Students have been tasked with choosing one energy source of personal interest, and then collaboratively planning, researching, creating and communicating their ideas digitally to then be linked to a whole-class platform. The task itself has already been very engaging, and we are excited to share the finished products with our families at the end of term.

Specialist – Auslan (LOTE)

Flexible Learning Space: The New Spotty Auslan Home

We have a bigger space this year which allows us to do more movement and role play activities. If you peek into the room, you will notice that our classroom is designed with seating in a U-shape or semi-circle to ensure students and teachers can communicate with anyone in their class. When students are signing it is important to be able to gain eye contact, see people's signing and their facial expression, therefore our U-shape seating facilitates this. Gallaudet University in America uses this method in their classrooms and Melbourne Polytechnic uses Gallaudet's DeafSpace principles in their Auslan classrooms too. Gallaudet has been the educational, political, social and economic engine of the deaf and signing community on a global scale for more than 150 years! In Auslan This term:

Preps have been learning what it means to be deaf and how some people in the deaf community use hearing devices. They have been exploring deafness through stories with characters who are deaf.



Please pop into the big building to have a look at the wonderful collage the Preps created!



Years 1-6 have been using greetings signs and requesting food through role play. This term each grade had the opportunity to set up and run their own Deaf fruit market. Students took it in turns to carry out the roles of shoppers and stall holders, making sure that their voices were off and that they only used signs to communicate. They had to request quantities, ask for the price and pay using pretend coins. Did you know that in the past there has been an annual Deaf Market in Bendigo run by Deaf Hub Bendigo and that there are market stalls each year at Deaf Festival Melbourne? Our students were interested to hear that they could use their skills in real life situations with the Deaf community.



Year 1-6 students have also been playing games that use questions to find out the answers. Students have been learning to use Auslan grammar when asking questions and adding facial expressions. 'What breakfast drink am I?' was one of those games where students had to guess the drink on their back by asking questions about colour and temperature.




